

Visit to McBraida plc – Rolls Royce Global Supplier of the Year 2022

What a revelation this was! A company owned by one of our Club members and his family and unknown to many members. Some of us knew it was an engineering company involved with aerospace – it said on the factory wall outside – but precisely what they made was a mystery. That said, fifteen of us were determined to find out and descended on the McBraidas and their team last Friday morning. We were greeted by Adam, Mike's grandson and Ian, Mike's son who gave us an introduction to our visit and handed out a printed potted history of the company which had been prepared by Mike.



The company was started by Felix McBraida, Mike's father, after the 2nd World War. He was a Jig & Tool draughtsman and this background led him to his dream of having his own engineering business. Starting up by renting an old boot factory in Kingswood with a staff of three – including himself – and two machines, work consisted of such things as building car trailers and repairing lawn-mowers. In 1954 the business was incorporated as F. McBraida Limited and in 1959 moved to another old boot factory a few miles from the original premises. The building was of three brick walls

and a sheet galvanised iron end panel. After a year or so at the new Bridgeyate premises, Felix had health problems and the threat of the company closing down persuaded Mike to leave his existing employment elsewhere and join the family firm. After a few more years, Father said 'enough is enough' and moved to Ireland leaving Mike to run the show. Having managed to secure the necessary approval for aircraft flight work Mike set about purchasing the modern machinery to manufacture the



precision aerospace components, although their first acquisitions were used for the overhaul of machines from the tobacco industry. More advanced machines were purchased and the company was able to pursue the early dream of making precision parts for the aero industry. The facility at Bridgeyate has been extended a couple of times and plans have recently been approved for further expansion. The growth of the company was such that customers were keen for McBraida to have a production facility abroad and premises have been acquired in Poland.



Our actual tour around the factory was led by Grandson Adam, with Son Ian riding shotgun to ensure no-one got left behind. We were introduced to the machinery which, all being enclosed in cabinets, looked very similar with type descriptions of Numerical Control, Computer Numerical Control and Electric Dialectric Machining no doubt with other types lurking in other booths. Although unable to see all the machining processes we were able to see the finished articles in trays awaiting transfer to Quality Control. Every boughtin ingot of metal, large and small, has a label which shows its source and progress through its production before being received by McBraida. QC is the watchword throughout the company, from the purchase of raw materials,


precision manufacturing with measurement checks to the micron before final checks and despatch to the customer.

Grandpa Felix must be looking down with great pride at what Mike has managed to create of his company with the help of the family and successful employment decisions.

Our thanks to the McBraida family for a very interesting and informative visit after which our party decamped to The Hollybush pub, just along the road, for an enjoyable lunch arranged by the other Mike – Bendrey!

October Dinner Night - a Talk on The Avon Wildlife Trust



(AWT) is the largest local charity working to protect wildlife and inspire people in the West of England and we were pleased to welcome Gill Sayzeland to our dinner to tell us about it. Gill is one of many volunteers who help AWT, in her case with practical field work at sites near Weston as well as giving talks. AWT works across the old county of Avon and

cover the four local authority areas of Bristol, Bath and North East Somerset, South Gloucestershire, and North Somerset. They care for 31 nature reserves - from ancient bluebell woods to Iron Age forts and nationally important wetlands, which are a haven for rare wading birds and wildflower meadows. Educational and community programmes help people of all ages connect with, and benefit from, the natural world around them, taking action themselves to help nature's recovery. They work with landowners across our region to reverse the decline in wildlife by creating connected living landscapes. Gill's talk was illustrated by many super pictures of the sites and work carried out there.
